Online mental health resource launched to support the education community

The resource features content from the Canadian Mental Health Association of Ontario (CMHA Ontario) and Children's Mental Health Ontario (CMHO).

The not-for-profit organization's commitment to mental health awareness and education is long-term.

"ReadyforLife.ca will be updated on an ongoing basis as we go forward, so it's always fresh and relevant for our teachers and members across the country," adds Mr. Cummings. "They are on the front lines with our youth every day, so we feel it's important for them to have access to a resource

He notes that their feedback and insights will also help shape the resource as it is continually tailored to meet the needs of Teachers Life members.

In addition to the value of the information on the site for the individual educator, the company also recognizes the important role educators play in the lives and well-being of students.

the needs of education workers and teachers, so we feel that it's important to ensure that any tool or resource we develop can help them in their day-today efforts," says Mr. Cummings.

As part of its mandate, Teachers Life's commitment also extends outside the school grounds and into the community. One of Teachers Life's major partnerships is with CMHA Ontario and the Ontario Hockey League (OHL).

'We sponsor a program called Talk Today that provides mental health support and raises awareness throughout OHL communities," says Mr. Cummings. The program also includes public address and video announcements in the venues and further outreach through social media.

Teachers Life has also been involved in several other initiatives such as sponsoring CMHO's annual video



contest, Change the View. This project invites youth to share their experiences with mental health and wellbeing by making a short video aimed at removing the stigma around mental health issues.

These projects align with raising awareness and removing the negative perceptions that can be associated with

mental illness, says Mr. Cummings. "I think it has been buried in the past; people didn't feel comfortable raising it," he adds.

"One objective of ReadyforLife.ca is to erode stigma and take that negativism off the table and say, 'This is something we need to talk about.' We need to build awareness so people don't feel uncomfortable raising it and then, if they need help, provide the resources and the avenues for them to get the help and support they need,"

UNESCO initiative focuses on teachers' role

World Teachers' Day – held every year on October 5 – is a UNESCO initiative to focus on the issues that impact teachers around the world.

The Canadian Teachers' Federation (CTF) is marking the day by highlighting the need for safe and caring schools.

The CTF, which represents more than 232,000 teachers across the country, chose the theme because of a growing concern expressed by its member organizations about violence in schools.

In a 2014 CTF national survey, 90.6 per cent of more than 5,000 teachers who responded indicated safe and caring schools as a major priority for the Federation's advocacy efforts during the 2015 federal election.

In June 2014 – the latest available numbers – Statistics Canada reported there were 756,900 teachers and professors in Canada. Of these, 68 per cent were women and the majority worked full-time.
